

# 2020 END-OF-SESSION REPORT

## *Colorado Homeschool Freedom Team*

The Colorado Homeschool Freedom Team is a ministry of CHEC which envisions families honoring Jesus Christ by embracing home discipleship that is Christ centered, parent led, and free from government control.

### **Colorado General Assembly**

The legislature convened on Wednesday, January 8th for the second regular session of the seventy-second general assembly. The Colorado Constitution says, "Regular sessions of the general assembly shall not exceed one hundred twenty calendar days." Since this wording was put in the Constitution by the citizens of Colorado in 1988, 120 calendar days meant the days were consecutive. On Saturday, March 14th, due to the declaration of an emergency by the governor the preceding Wednesday, the legislature sent an interrogatory to the Colorado Supreme Court to ask them if calendar days could be considered non consecutive during an emergency, and then they promptly recessed until the end of May. The Colorado Supreme Court, with a 4-3 vote, issued an opinion that the language was ambiguous and could therefore be interpreted as nonconsecutive despite the voters' clear intent outlined in the voter guide of 1988.

The legislature remained in recess until Tuesday, May 26th and finally adjourned on Monday, June 15th which was listed as the 84th day of the session.

### **Bills Called "Slate of Hate" by the Majority Party**

Six (HB20-1033, HB20-1063, HB20-1114, HB20-1144, HB20-1272, and HB20-1273) of seven bills heard in the House State, Veterans, & Military Affairs Committee on Thursday, February 13th were deemed hateful by the seven LGBTQ lawmakers and others in the majority party at a press conference that morning. The bills brought would have upheld parental rights and religious liberty in Colorado. Instead, Colorado parents, especially Christian parents, should be concerned that their values and their rights are being undermined thanks to the majority party's antagonism towards fundamental rights. *All the bills were killed after 12 hours of grueling testimony.*

### **Immunization Bill**

In 2019, an immunization bill to change several aspects of immunizations for school entry was stopped. This year, a similar bill was brought forth and had made it through half the process before the legislature went on recess. Despite the claim that they would only deal with emergency legislation, SB20-163 School Entry Immunization was scheduled for a Sunday afternoon committee hearing. Thousands in opposition showed up, but only a handful were heard. Unsurprisingly, the bill passed. Fortunately, with God's help, we were able to exclude homeschoolers from the new requirements for exemptions. Yet, the bill still gives the Colorado Department of Public Health & Environment (CDPHE) increased authority over immunizations and the data they collect which continues to be problematic.

### **Targeting Homeschoolers**

Early in the session, a bill (HB20-1011 *Helping Others Manage Early Childhood Act*) to educate parents on skills needed to enter kindergarten included the targeting of homeschoolers. With some common sense persuasion, we were able to get the bill amended to remove the specific language around homeschoolers. It was postponed because of the emergency recess and will probably not be back next year.

Opposition to home education is heating up across the nation just as more families consider it because of the new health requirements in classrooms due to the coronavirus pandemic. ### **SB20-072 Human Sexuality Education Notification Requirements (failed)**

Would have allowed parents to actually see the curriculum being used to teach sexuality to their children and give them 90 days' notice before the program begins. *Killed on a party-line vote.*

### **SB20-077 Born Alive Child Physician Relationship (failed) (See also HB20-1068)**

Would have established a relationship between the physician and the child as soon as the child is born alive. If this bill had passed, a doctor would not be able to leave a baby to die. *Killed on a party-line vote.*

### **SB20-084 Prohibit Requiring Employee Immunization (failed)**

Would have forbade an employer from discriminating against an employee or prospective employee based on their immunization status. *Killed on a party-line vote.*

### **SB20-100 Repeal the Death Penalty (passed)**

Eliminates the option of the death penalty in all cases. *Governor Polis signed this bill into law on Monday, March 23rd and commuted the death sentence of the three men on death row to life in prison without the possibility of parole.*

### **SB20-163 School Entry Immunization (passed)**

Although we were able to amend this bill to exclude homeschoolers from the new exemption requirements, this bill is still a huge overreach by the government into parental rights and religious liberty. *Governor signed this bill into law.*

### **SB20-200 Implementation of CO Secure Savings Program (passed)**

Creates a new government program to manage a retirement savings plan overseen by the state. Employers must participate. *No Republicans voted for this bill.*

### **HB20-1002 College Credit For Work Experience (passed)**

Establishes a council to look at awarding college credit for work experience. Passed with three Republicans voting against: *Representatives Humphrey, Neville, and Sandridge.*

### **HB20-1031 Replace Columbus Day with New State Holiday (passed)**

Replaces Columbus Day with Francis Xavier Cabrini day. *Party-line vote except for three Democrats who voted against this bill: Representatives Buentello, Kraft-Tharp, and Donald Valdez.*

### **HB20-1033 Live and Let Live Act (failed)**

Would have kept the government from discriminating against people who believe marriage is between one man and one woman, and that gender is determined by biology at birth. Covered several areas of law. *Killed on a party-line vote.*

### **HB20-1063 Fundamental Family Rights in Colorado (failed)**

Would have supported a parent's right to direct the upbringing, education, and care of their child. *Killed on a party-line vote.*

### **HB20-1068 Born Alive Child Physician Relationship (failed) (See also SB20-077)**

Would have established a relationship between the physician and the child as soon as the child is born alive. If it had passed, a doctor would not be able to leave a baby to die. *Killed on a party-line vote.*

### **HB20-1075 Protect Human Life at Conception (failed)**

Would have made sure a physician did everything in their power to preserve the life of mother and baby. *Killed on a party-line vote.*

### **HB20-1114 Protect Minors from Mutilation and Sterilization (failed)**

Would have made it unlawful for a doctor to provide sex reassignment treatment to a minor. This bill would have eliminated access to surgical and nonsurgical (hormone therapies) procedures for the purpose of facilitating sex reassignment. *Killed on a party-line vote.*

### **HB20-1144 Parent's Bill of Rights (failed)**

Would have protected the rights of parents to make decisions regarding the upbringing, education, and health care of their children. *Killed on a party-line vote.*

### **HB20-1153 CO Partnership for Quality Jobs & Services (passed)**

Establishes a way for public employees to unionize. *Passed along party lines.*

### **HB20-1158 Insurance Cover Infertility Diagnosis Treatment Preserve: (passes)**

Mandates insurance companies to cover infertility procedures. *Only six Republicans voted for this bill: Senators Coram and Crowder, and Representatives Baisley, Landgraf, Soper and VanWinkle.*

### **HB20-1239 Consumer Protections Concerning Vaccinations (failed)**

Would have made sure parents are fully informed of the risks before consenting to a vaccine. Also, would have mandated that doctors report adverse reactions. *Killed on a party-line vote.*

### **HB20-1272 Colorado Natural Marriage & Adoption Act (failed)**

Would have allowed only marriages that are between a man and a woman to be recognized by Colorado (as stated in the CO Constitution). It would also have impacted adoptions within the state of Colorado. *Killed on a party-line vote.*

### **HB20-1273 Equality & Fairness in Youth Sports Act (failed)**

Would have allowed only females determined by biological indicators to participate in sports designated for girls in the 6th through 12th grades. *Killed on a party-line vote of 6-3.*

### **HB20-1287 Colorado Rights Act (failed)**

Would have allowed CO citizens to sue state actors when their state Constitutional rights are violated. *Sponsor pulled the bill in committee.*

### **HB20-1297 Immunization Status & Child Abuse Neglect (passed)**

Protects parents against unwarranted CPS investigations because of a child's immunization status or whether they have opted-out of the state database. *Two Democrats voted against: Representatives Buentello and A. Valdez.*

## **Bills Postponed Due to Shortened Session**

*Most of these bills will be back in 2021*

### **SB20-156 Protecting Preventative Health Care Coverage: (postponed)**

Would have expanded the list of mandates insurance companies must cover including procedures like abortions under family planning. Would have allowed a minor to consent to preventive measures (Heb B & HPV vaccine) and any medications to treat sexually transmitted infections with no need for parental consent or notification. *Postponed indefinitely because of its \$1M price tag.*

### **HB20-1006 Early Childhood Mental Health Consultants: (postponed)**

Would have charged the Department of Human Services (DHS) with expanding their programs across the state to support mental health for children from prenatal to eight years old in a variety of settings. *Passed out of committee on a party-line vote.*

### **HB20-1008 Health Care Cost-Sharing Consumer Protections: (postponed)**

This bill seeks to stop health sharing ministries from offering their services during the open enrollment of insurance companies. It also would force these ministries to share their financials, their internal practices, and much more with the government. *The bill was amended and passed through the committee on a party-line vote.*

### **HB20-1011 Helping Others Manage Early Childhood Act: (postponed)**

Would have directed DHS to contract with an outside company to provide a state-wide public awareness campaign around early childhood education. *Representative Wilson kept his word and amended the bill to remove specific language around home educating families!*

### **HB20-1105 Colorado TRAILS System Requirements: (postponed)**

Would have prohibited the DHS from putting families suspected of abuse or neglect into their tracking system without notice and a hearing.

### **HB20-1147 Reasonable Independence for Children's Activities: (postponed)**

Would have kept parents from being charged with neglect if they allowed their children reasonable independence. *Passed the House with bipartisan support.*



### **HB20-1149 16-year-olds Voting in School District Elections: (postponed)**

Would have allowed 16-year-olds to vote in school board elections. Opens the door for them to vote in other elections. *Passed out of committee on a party-line vote.*

### **HB20-1292 Uniform Parentage Act: (postponed)**

Seeks to totally rewrite the language around parentage in statute.

### **HB20-1355 Secure Storage of Firearms: (postponed)**

Seeks to set new standards for securing firearms.

### **HB20-1356 Lost or Stolen Firearms: (postponed)**

Seeks to require reporting a stolen or lost firearm within 48 hours.

## **Bills Introduced After the Emergency Declared**

### **SB20-204 Additional Resources to Protect Air Quality (passed)**

Creates a new government enterprise to manage the over \$1M to \$5M in fees collected. (Note: Fees collected by enterprises are not subject to TABOR.) *Senator Priola was the only Republican voting for this bill.*

### **SB20-205 Sick Leave for Employees (passed)**

Mandates certain employers to accrue sick leave days to be used during a health emergency. *Of note: Representative Benavidez voted no; Senator Priola voted yes. Otherwise, the vote was along party lines.*

### **SB20-215 Health Insurance Affordability Enterprise (passed)**

The summary says this government-run enterprise will “provide services” to insurance carriers and hospitals for a “fee”. The fee imposed will impact insurance rates. (Note: Fees collected by enterprises are not subject to TABOR.) *Republicans voting for: Senators Coram and Crowder. Democrat voting against: Representative Kraft-Tharp.*

### **SB20-217 Enhance Law Enforcement Integrity (passed)**

This bill was introduced after the protests erupted at the Capitol and quickly passed through the process. It attempts to put in place policies and procedures to increase law enforcement officers’ accountability. *Republican Senators Scott & Sonnenberg voted against this bill, while Representatives Catlin, Champion, Geitner, Holtorf, Humphrey, Landgraf, Neville, Ransom, Rich, VanWinkle and Wilson voted for the bill.*

### **SB20-218 CDPHE Hazardous Substances Response (passed)**

Imposes a fee on all manufacturers of fuel products in CO or companies who distribute fuel in CO. The fee will be used to mitigate PFAS. The science is not settled on whether these chemicals pose a serious harm. *Party line vote except the following Republicans voted for the bill: Senator Priola and Representatives Bockenfeld, McKean and Will.*
