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y wife, Tara, and I were both blessed to be homeschooled by our parents all the way through high school. Now, as a second generation homeschooler and leader within the homeschool community, I love to talk about the benefits of homeschooling, help parents get started, defend homeschooling at their state Capitol, and promote and facilitate homeschooling wherever I can.

When you watch a sporting event, many of the fans will show their support by wearing their team's colors or their favorite player's jersey. But then there is that guy who really gets into it. The cameras always find him. Well, I am THAT guy for homeschooling!

All that said, it might then strike you as odd that I am writing about why you should NOT homeschool! Well, before you get any more confused, let's jump into it.

The first reason you should NOT homeschool is "home." Many parents who are beginning their homeschool journey think largely in terms of location. They desire to give their child a "good education" (as defined by the culture) and believe that changing the location of "where" education is done will lead to success by eliminating the peripheral factors that were negatively affecting their child at public or private school. However, if you view "home" schooling primarily as a change in the location of education, then you are missing out on the greatest opportunities and blessings that homeschooling can provide. I believe that the "where" will ultimately be determined by the "what" and the "why" — which are of much greater significance.

This brings me to the second reason you should NOT homeschool. That reason is ... (did you guess it?) ... "school." That is because for most of us, when we think "school," we think "academics." We think math, science, grammar ... and we think grades. Grades, which lead to universities which lead to professions which lead to financial wealth. There are plenty of studies which prove

homeschoolers perform very, very well academically, and statistically better than public or private schoolers. Academics are certainly an attractive and compelling reason to choose homeschooling.

But if academics are your primary consideration when it comes to school choices, it's time to rethink the "what" of the education you are aiming for. As I said earlier, the "what" and the "why" will ultimately determine the "where." But what "what" could be more on point for homeschooling than the "what" of academics?


In the Great Commission, Jesus tells us that our main job as believers, and as Christian parents, is to make disciples. Therefore, our mission is clear, simple, and carries profound implications for how we look at education. As Christian parents we MUST think in terms of making disciples rather than academics of our children. Academics are an important context for Christian discipleship, but they are not the goal. That is why CHEC's Vision Statement says that "we (CHEC) envision families honoring Jesus Christ by embracing **home discipleship** that is Christ centered, parent directed, and free from government control." Notice the absence of the words "school," "academics," or "education."

Scripture makes it clear that parents are to take a primary role in the training and instruction of their children (Ephesians 6:4). Scripture also instructs parents to integrate the word of God into all activities of their children's day (Deuteronomy 6:7). For these reasons, both "home" and "school" are ideal contexts for the Christian discipleship of children. Remember, neither "school" or doing it at "home" is the end goal!

If you are new to homeschooling, perhaps you have never thought in terms of "academics" vs. "discipleship." I encourage you to attend the upcoming Rocky Mountain Homeschool Conference, June 15-17, 2023, where you will join thousands of other homeschoolers in a deep dive into all things homeschooling and home discipleship. Whatever season of homeschooling you find yourself in, perhaps it's time to take a closer look at the "what" that is driving your homeschooling? Here are some practical questions to ask yourself that might help you determine if you have the right priorities.

- Was having family worship today more important than getting the math lessons complete?
- Did I verbally praise God when my child learned something new about His creation?
- Did I take time to shepherd my child's heart throughout the day, or was I more concerned with staying on schedule?
- Do I integrate God's Word into all aspects of my child's day, and am I careful to select a curriculum that helps me do this?
- Do my child's history lessons emphasize
 God's hand of providence over the affairs
 of men, His redemptive plan in history,
 and the growth of His church. Or the rise,
 accomplishments, and fall of men and their
 empires?
- Am I more concerned with how I model Christ to my child or my teaching abilities?
- Do I consider my children's need for nurture, training, or discipline a valuable opportunity for discipleship, or do I view those needs as a distraction from "school"?



- Does our family routinely serve the body of Christ or help those in need, or does service get pushed aside for academics and extracurricular activities?
- Am I more concerned with character than I am with grades?
- Do I plan and invest more into my child's eternal future than in their financial future?

This is by no means an exhaustive list. But I hope it will help to get you thinking about the "what" and "why" of your homeschooling.

I want to leave you with a reminder of the "why" for home discipleship, which is the glory of God, obedience to His clear commands, and the salvation of the souls of our children. If we remember these "whys," then the "what" and the "where" will fall into place.



n His graciousness, the Lord has outlined how we are to run the race of life on a daily basis. Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely. and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith (Hebrews 12:1-2a ESV).

Little did I know that as a young junior high school boy, praying to God for direction in life, that He would lead me ultimately to the "race of life." I simply wanted to be on a sports team and make some friends. As a high school sophomore, I signed up for cross country. I loved running! After years of hard work and training, it eventually brought me wonderful honors and success. I achieved world records, seven front covers on the Sports Illustrated magazine, an Olympic Silver Medal, ESPN's High School Athlete of the 20th Century — even a letter jacket!

However, after all those wonderful successes, I was empty. Life was all about me. There was always a thirsting for more. On May 18, 1972, when my wife, Anne, and I truly became Christians, I realized for the first time that all those marvelous earthly rewards could not earn God's love. Struggling and striving for acceptance had only left me empty. On that night of accepting Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior, giving Him control of my life, I learned He freely gives His love. I did not have to earn it. World records and medals hanging on my letter jacket could not earn something that was free.

At that moment, I began the race of life. I changed coaches from my wonderful high school and college coach, Bob Timmons (who had put up with a lot of my complaining), to Jesus Christ who became the author and perfecter of my faith. That faith would give me the courage to do simple things for Christ, like offer a homeless person a free meal. That faith would give me the conviction to humble myself to ask forgiveness from my wife and others. This newfound relationship with Jesus Christ would get me off the pedestal of serving self and begin teaching me to love and serve others.

This spiritual race of faith has some similarities to running physically. Both the spiritual and physical races require daily training and perseverance. Perseverance is sticking with a task or individual despite difficulty or delay in achieving success.

There are also differences between the physical and spiritual races. One race is for self glory, the other is for eternal glory. The physical race develops your body, is timed, is a certain distance you run against others, is for medals, letter jackets, and awards.









During the spiritual race, you are not racing against someone, this race is just for you. It is not a timed event nor is the length of the race revealed prior to the start. This race lasts your lifetime. This spiritual race develops in you humility and interest in helping others and is run with Someone, not against others. That Someone is Jesus Christ, who is one step ahead of you, showing you the way. This race will be challenging, as well as rewarding. This race will develop Christ-like character, including spiritual faithfulness, self-control, patience, goodness, gentleness, joy, kindness, peace, and love. In this race you will stumble and falter, but you have Jesus alongside you, who will pick you up, not condemn you. He will encourage you and give you wisdom for your individual life journey.

Which race will you choose?

As my running achievements decreased later in my track career, my life obligations increased. Married with children, God had different kinds of races for me and my family to run as we served Him. Anne and I had been convicted as young Christians that we were to parent our children intentionally in Christ, which included teaching not only Bible stories, but God's principles. Like us, each of our children established his or her own daily time with the Lord, and became involved with a Bible memorization program.

In the summer of 1983, I happened to be in Omaha, Nebraska doing a radio interview when I providentially met Dr. Raymond Moore, author of *Better Late Than Early*. Considered the "father" of the modern home education movement, he introduced me to the concept of homeschooling. Anne and I had been praying about the path we were to take concerning

our four children's education. At that time, they were enrolled in the government school system.

Simultaneously, one of Anne's brothers wrote to tell us that he and his wife had started homeschooling their first born child in Portland, Oregon. With Dr. Moore's assistance, we contacted a Kansas lawyer who had worked with other homeschooling families. He helped us through the legalities of beginning our homeschool journey. And what a journey it was!

When we began homeschooling, our youngest daughter, Catharine, was in third grade, our twin sons, Ned and Drew, in fifth grade, and our eldest daughter, Heather, was in seventh grade. In alignment with education laws at that time, we became a satellite school to Cair Paravel in Topeka, Kansas.

Our morning routine became something like this: a jog outdoors of a few miles, tidying up bedrooms and dressing for school (we never wore pajamas during school hours), individual devotional quiet times, then everyone pitching in to prepare breakfast. Morning family devotions began with reading the Word of God together and praying.

We then commenced our "school" routine, which included listening on the radio to Elisabeth Elliot and Derek Prince who each had 15-minute teachings.

We learned how to take lecture notes as we listened.

Afternoons were spent exploring individual interests (including music, raising sheep, cooking and baking, and horticulture) as well as being employed nannying, cleaning homes, and helping with yard work.

Homeschooling also afforded us the opportunity to evangelize and participate in various mission trips to such places as Jamaica and Mexico. Anne and I are so grateful for our homeschool marathon which

brought us together as a family and trained our children to become godly men and women of character.

This race of life requires perseverance, endurance, trials, tribulations, and challenges, much of which I learned about in physical running for self-glory. The race I now run has a finish line as well, but I'm not there yet. That comes at my death when I will be greeted by Jesus Christ with His words from Matthew 25:21, Well done, My good and faithful servant; enter into your rest.

As I reflect on my life, I am in awe of God's goodness and am reminded of this Psalm of David: I will give thanks to the Lord with my whole heart; I will recount all of Your wonderful deeds. I will be glad and exult in You; I will sing praise to Your name, O Most High (Psalm 9:1–2 ESV). The Lord has performed many wonderful deeds in our lives and He will do so again. We should all be expectant, waiting and depending on Him as He leads us to finish our race strong for His glory and honor.

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am so grateful that God makes twoyear-olds absolutely adorable because it is right around that age that you can feel like you have had it with this parenting gig. You look in the mirror to find that the sweet, gentle mama that rocked her baby to sleep has disappeared, and a fire-breathing mama with anger issues and is in her place. At the very least, it can feel that way.

Navigating the tantrums and defiance your two-year-old throws your way, while cleaning up the messes

they're capable of creating can leave you feeling like you're dealing with an enemy rather than the child you love. And, instead of feeling like an in-control adult, you find yourself tempted to succumb to similar childlike foolishness; tantrums, defiance, and manipulation. (Yes, adults can play the same games their children do!)

Friend, you're not the only one.

Maybe you've started to question whether you're the right woman for the job? Or wondered if God just missed the part that you tend toward impatience, anger, selfishness, and being unwise? How does He expect us to not ruin our kids when He knows how messed up we are?

Maybe you reached a breaking point and mapped out a plan to speak and act nicely, starting the next morning. You confidently proclaimed, "I will never do that again." Whatever "that" is, we promise ourselves and

the Lord that we'll be on our best behavior from this point forward.

Unfortunately, making promises

and playing nice still leaves us disappointed and full of despair when we come up short and incapable of doing the very thing we promised ourselves we'd do. The ugly tone of voice still spills out. The condescending look takes over our face even when we try to hide it. Our best efforts are simply not good enough.

Every mama — those who have forever aspired to the calling of motherhood and those who have been thrust into it reluctantly alike — finds themselves

inadequate for the task of motherhood at some point. No matter how many parenting books you've read, how many friends and relatives you've watched parent, or how many babysitting hours you've banked, nothing blunts the overwhelming fact that our weakness as moms, plus the foolishness of children, equals potential for great despair.

But, friend, motherhood is *not* some cruel joke through which God seeks to highlight your failures, or leave you feeling helpless because of your own upbringing, unhealthy examples, or lack of personal growth and self-control.

It's just that our best was never *meant* to be good enough.

Jesus didn't save us so that we could do mother-hood on our own, apart from Him. He saved us so that we would be forever connected to Him, forever dependent on Him and on the sustenance that flows through the cord of His unending love. Can I remind you that Jesus was cut off from the Father that we might not be cut off from Him?

Motherhood is the loving vessel through which God seeks to highlight His sufficiency and ability, and grow your awareness of His faithfulness. His pure and sinless life led to His provision for your righteousness on the cross. He substitutes your dead end with His new beginning.

When we remember that we were never designed to do motherhood apart from His enabling, we can learn to embrace our deficiencies as mothers as opportunities to see God's grace.

- If we parent consistently and show patience, it is God's grace — His sanctifying work in us.
- If our children obey, it is God's grace in us — that enables and instructs us in faithfulness as mothers.
- If our children defy us in disobedience, it is God's grace — that we might have the opportunity to show the Gospel to our children once again.

 If we struggle to be the mamas we desire to be, it is God's grace — that we would be reminded once again of the price paid on our behalf, the worthiness of Christ bestowed on us.

You see? Motherhood is all grace. From beginning to end.

God *did* see you. He saw all your impatience, anger, selfishness, and foolishness. And in Christ, He counts you as righteous. He knows your weaknesses, and He's transforming you through them.

So if, today, you are crying out feeling helpless to be the mother you hoped you'd be, remember: His arms are open and you're exactly where you need to be. Here, God says, "Now, child, you are ready for what I have for you. You are ready to become the mama I will make you to be."

Motherhood isn't only for the qualified — none of us are qualified! Motherhood is for those God qualifies through Christ. Lean in, friend. He's got you.


Learning math takes a lot of mental muscle regardless of curriculum. Christian Light Math uses a spiral learning method to make learning easier for students in Grades 1-9:

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f you're thinking: "Really? Another task for my list? The news, of all things? I'm trying to diminish things that trigger anxiety!" Well, I am right there with you!

Most of my life, I have seen the news as something to avoid. During my teens, if my mom turned on the television between 7:00 and 9:00 pm, I promptly escaped into a book. When my dad recommended I apply to WORLD Journalism Institute as a next step to developing my love of writing, in a reversal from Jonah's story, I pursued missions instead! "One ticket to not news-reporting, please!" At age 20, I knew I would *never* want *anything* to do with the news.

Now here I am, working for WORLD News Group, a now 40-year-old news organization. The process that drew me here unfolded circuitously. Ultimately, my love of learning required me to move out of my one-dimensional perspective. It finally hit me that the news serves as a snapshot into all the subjects I love: art, food, science, music, film, philosophy — the who, what, when, where, why, and how of our current age. It provides in "short" form all that I had learned to love in "long" form — a short story as opposed to a Russian novel (I still haven't made it through *The Brothers Karamazov*).

My appreciation grew beyond self-serving. As with Jonah's story, I now have a better view of missions. Consider these words from my seminary professor, Dr. Jimmy Agan: "All Scripture reveals something of the person or work of Christ, or man's need of it." This concise hermeneutic (or interpretive framework) for God's special revelation may also be applied to His general revelation (Creation). By God's grace, and for His own glory, everything in this world reveals something of the person or work of Christ, or our need of it.

And man, do we feel that need! In this Age of Information, a year's dose of content bombards us on a daily basis. If we are not careful, the barrage we can receive at every waking moment could oversaturate us — like one of those cartoon characters drinking out of a hose, ballooning ten times his usual size. With the news in particular, this often leaves us anxious, discouraged, and afraid. Where can we find hope amidst all the despair? Why even put ourselves in that place? Why not cut off the media stream completely? Insulate. Isolate. Protect.

But is that a godly response?

The psalmist wrote, *The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein* (Psalm 24:1 ESV), and *The heavens declare the glory of God, and the sky above proclaims his handiwork* (Psalm 19:1 ESV). If we take God at His

word, we believe He controls it all. We recognize His world reflects something of Himself for all to see. His eternal power and divine nature have been clearly perceived, ever since the creation of the world, in the things that have been made (Romans 1:20 ESV), and For from him and through him and to him are all things (Romans 11:36 ESV). Chapters 38–41 of Job remind the reader — through the lens of human suffering permitted in Job's life by God's own hand — that the Lord has charge of all things.

The Creator-God also displayed His authority as Lawgiver, revealing to man the right way of living. Through the law, we not only learn something of His character and nature but also of sin and our inability to live righteous lives. Most radically, God reveals Himself within human history in His Incarnate Son, "God with us," to seek, save, and send us out in His name (see Luke 19:10 and Matthew 28:19–20).

What does this have to do with the news and current events? Allow me to trace the thread with a story from last year, when I started at WORLD. My youngest daughter (then 6 years old) and I began listening to "The World and Everything In It" — WORLD's daily news podcast that borrows its title from Scripture. One day, she looked up and said "Mommy, we need to know what is going on in the world, so that we can know what to do in it."

This statement hit me equally as profoundly as my professor's. God commanded Adam and Eve: *Be truitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it, and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over every living thing that moves on the earth* (Genesis 1:28). In this creation mandate, God defined how human expression in His world ought to look. He gave us both procreative work and "subcreative" work (to borrow from J.R.R. Tolkien) — "creating" with the materials provided by and under the authority of the One who made all things from nothing.

My daughter's precocious statement brought another command to mind, another way for us to multiply, fill the earth, subdue it: the discipleship mandate. Jesus instructed His followers to *Go therefore and make disciples of all nations* (Matthew 28:19 ESV), making them agents of His, extending His kingdom to the ends of the earth ... and everything in it.

So now, I incorporate my daughter's observation into a stance for all of life: Everything in His Word, everything in His world, also reveals the Lord's design for human work and agency within it.

He has called us to make His glory known through all of our work, play, study, relationships ... any human endeavor, as for the Lord and not for men (Colossians 3:23 ESV). Perhaps this convicts you, as it does me, for, He uses us as major players in His restorative work in the world. Maybe it affirms you, and you sigh with relief — it is not all up to me! His Spirit equips us to do His will, engage His world, learn, grow, intercede, and go.

I have the privilege of working for an organization that believes and applies these things. We report

on the world through the understanding that it is His. What we know and experience of God, His provision and intentions for us and His world, gives us what we need to observe and engage it with discernment, prayerfully, and for His glory. At God's WORLD News, we say "biblical literacy fuels news literacy" and work towards "building news literacy to better live out the Gospel." We offer a look at the world through the lens of Truth, telling the "good news of the Gospel" even as we report on human brokenness.

Not every organization works like WORLD. Yet no organization operates outside of God's authority. We can have confidence and hope — until the day Christ returns — His hand is in it all. When we learn

about current events, we do so with the knowledge that everything in His world shows something of who He is, what He has done, or man's need for *Him* and shows us what we can do to partner with Him. So, believer: How will you respond?

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aybe you memorized this rich psalm as a child, as I did. But perhaps you were pretty convinced that your "joyful noise" was more noise than singing. Many adults are convinced they can't sing.

Often this is based on the thoughtless words of an adult who told them at a young age that they couldn't carry a tune, so they have spent a lifetime thinking they can't sing. The fact is, most children can't sing on pitch by themselves until they are *at least* 8–10 years old. Younger children can sometimes sing in tune if someone else sings or plays along with them. It is the exceptional child who sings well without support during the early grades.

Regardless of their own perceived lack of talent, most Christian parents are eager for

their children to experience the joys of music. Making music opens the way for artistic expression, develops physical coordination, provides social benefits, and teaches self-discipline. And, most importantly, music is a gift from God — one that we can take with us into eternity. Martin Luther wrote, "I truly desire that all Christians would love and regard as worthy the lovely gift of music, which is a precious, worthy,

and costly treasure given mankind by God ... next to the Word of God, the noble art of music is the greatest treasure in this world This precious gift has been given to man alone that he might thereby remind himself of the fact that God has created man for the express purpose of praising and extolling God."

But many homeschoolers have trouble fitting music into their school days. Time constraints, expense, and lack of confidence all contribute to the problem. Some choose private lessons or enroll their children

in a choir. Both are wonderful experiences. But there are many ways you can bring music into your homeschool, even if you really can not carry a tune or read music.

Our Musical Heritage

Do not let your children grow up without knowing the patriotic and folk songs of our country. Explore WeeSing.com to find recordings of well-trained children singing such old favorites as *Billy Boy, Little Red Caboose*, and *O Susanna*. Be sure they know the words to *America the Beautiful, The Star-Spangled Banner*, and *God Bless America*. Sing them in the car or when taking a break. Talk about the lyrics; help them see the humor in "the sun so hot I froze to death" in Polly Wolly Doodle. Research the stories behind the songs. Learn a common song in several languages.¹

Musical Vocabulary

Dynamic markings are the means composers use to communicate how loud the music should be played. We use Italian terms because the concept

of writing music as we know it today was developed in Italy. Choose a song you know well, such as *Are You Sleeping, Brother John?* to teach the concept of dynamics in music. Make signs with cartoon figures demonstrating words such as *pianissimo* or *mezzo-forte*. As one child holds up a sign, everyone in the family must sing the song at that dynamic level.

To develop volume control, hide a small object while one child is out of the room. The family helps him find it by singing louder when he is close to it and softer when he is farther away. Carry the learning over into daily life as you remind your children that their inside voices should be *mezzo-piano* (medium-soft) and to reserve their *forte* (loud) voices for outdoors.

Tempo means time in music — how fast the music is played. Teach tempo markings while taking a break from your schoolwork. Sing *Head, Shoulders, Knees, and Toes* very slowly, touching each body part as you sing; this tempo is called *largo*. Gradually work your way up to *presto* when you will be moving so fast everyone will fall to the floor in a pile of giggles.

Musical Instruments

Consider learning to play the recorder. This historic instrument is not difficult to learn. I once taught a dozen homeschool moms, many of whom had never read music or played an instrument, to play the recorder in one hour. Immediately afterward, I gave a follow-up lesson to the children, with moms present. The moms continued learning and teaching at home and the children played a few pieces at their year-end event a few weeks later.² Perhaps your support group will want to do this as a group activity, but any homeschool parent with fingers and a mouth can teach her own children the rudiments.

If your child shows an interest in music after you've taught him what you can, offer him the opportunity to take private music lessons. Students who learn to play alone and sometimes in groups can often bless others with their music. Piano is a wonderful foundation for learning other instruments or for voice. Research shows that music training, specifically piano instruction, leads to scores an average of 34% higher on tests measuring the spatial-temporal

ability used in math, chess, science, and engineering. If finances are tight, perhaps the teacher would be willing to barter for baked goods or services such as windowwashing or lawn care.

Odds and Ends


To teach attentiveness, clap a short rhythm pattern and have your child echo it back. Gradually clap longer patterns. Have him color or paint to music sometimes. Toss a ball or bean bag (easier to catch than a ball) back and forth in time with the music. Have your child clap, sing, and march with music you have in your home. Talk about how the music makes him feel and what kind of moving he wants to do when he hears that music. Saint-Saëns' *Carnival of the Animals* (I prefer the orchestra version) is a wonderful selection of short pieces for movement and interpretation.

Do simple dances that do not require partners or large groups. Consider *Here We Go Looby-Loo, Hokey-Pokey,* or *London Bridge Is Falling Down.* Find a square dance caller and invite him to your support group meeting for a fun family night. Most callers are used to teaching novices how to do the various steps. There is something special about seeing a little girl swinging arms with her daddy.

Attend local concerts. Watch for mention of recitals offered by local piano and voice studios. Take advantage of youth concerts offered by local symphonies. Some communities have concert associations that bring in professional musicians several times a year. Ask your Chamber of Commerce about other options.

Play quiet hymns and Bible choruses to greet the new day — they set the tone for worship so much better than the blaring of the TV. I like to collect recordings of Christian music played on different instruments — hammered dulcimers, mandolins, fife and drum, and even the bagpipes. Hearing these reminds me of the worldwide Church and the fellowship we enjoy with believers near and far.





Ask God, the Father of music, to show you how to bring music into your home. Soon you and your family will be "making a joyful noise."

very once in a while, a moment comes along in life that I call a "defining moment" or "a moment of epiphany." These moments are powerful, for they have the ability to change vour future. I have had a dozen or so. I've come to believe that many people do not recognize them — or at the very least — do not allow them to significantly impact their lives like God has intended them to.

My first defining moment happened when I was in the 4th grade. Being the last of seven children, I was a very average student, putting forth average effort to receive average grades,

and I was happy with that. A week or so into the school year, the science teacher assigned ten words for us to study. I remember my mother asking if I had any schoolwork to do. I replied, "The science teacher gave us some words to study, but I'll do it later." My mother encouraged me to reconsider, but I was okay with my average effort of doing it later. The next day, the teacher called four students to the chalkboard. one of them being me. He gave each of us a different word to write on the board along with its definition. My word was "algae."

Fifty years later, I can still remember the feeling of total humiliation as I stood alone in the front of the class with the chalk in my hand, having no idea how to even spell the word let alone write its definition. After the teacher allowed me to wallow in my embarrassment, he looked at me and said, "Well, that isn't the Blacks that I know. Go sit down." That was a defining moment for me, for I had an epiphany. I vowed that I would never be humiliated or embarrassed like that again because of my lack of effort. I went from a "C" student to an "A+" student in sixty seconds. To this day, that moment of epiphany affects how I work. Colossians 3:23 ESV states, Whatever you do, work heartily, as for the Lord and not for men.

My mother was quite upset with the teacher because she said it could have backfired and caused me to not care at all. Although I didn't have the maturity to understand it at the time, recognizing the moment and allowing it to alter my trajectory for good or bad was my decision. These moments are given by the hands of the Potter as He forms the clay of our lives.

Defining moments can come in times of triumph, tragedy, or in quiet moments of reflection, when the whisper of God falls on your heart. Such was the case with another defining moment in my life. After spending nine years developing a promising career in the United States Air Force, first as a tactical combat communications officer and then as an F-16 fighter pilot. I chose to exit the military and work for my father and my brothers at a small plastics company as a design and automation engineer. At the time, Andrea and I had four children and God was calling my heart to my family. After two years back in my small hometown with two more children, I remember driving home after a boring day at work thinking, "What have I done? I used to fly fighters for the Air Force, defending our nation's freedom. Now I cut grooves in a piece of steel, and no one cares or knows what I did for the last eight hours. Surely, I've

messed up and taken a wrong turn. Lord ... I want to do something great for you and this sure doesn't feel great."

I can tell you the exact spot on the road where God's guiet whisper came to my heart. He said to me, "Chuck, you are going home to my great work for you. I have given you six children to raise, disciple, train, equip, and launch for my kingdom. Go and do that well." That moment of epiphany was significant in defining my motivation as a father for the next sixteen years. With renewed joy, I poured my energy into being the dad God wanted me to be. It was just a few weeks after that moment that God gave me a story to write, Kingdom's Edge. Because of that moment, I now share stories of encouragement to young people throughout the world through the 20 books I've written.

Defining moments are what authors call "plot points," moments in a character's life where pressure forces him or her to change course. We are each the main character in our story of life. Don't miss your plot points. Identify them and use them to move you closer to Jesus and align with His call on your life.

In Mark chapter 10, the Bible tells us about Bartimaeus and one of his defining moments. Bartimaeus was blind and sitting beside the road when he heard that Jesus was passing by. He began to shout for the Son of David to have mercy on him. Although the crowd told him to be guiet, he shouted all the louder. This was his moment of epiphany, and he wasn't about to let it pass him by. Finally, Jesus called for him and asked him, "What do you want me to do for you?" Bartimaeus asked Jesus to heal his blindness, and He did.

Dads, the next time you experience a defining moment, or a moment of epiphany, realize that Jesus is walking by. Are you ready to cry out for mercy? Are you ready to answer God's question, "What do you want me to do for you?" When Jesus healed Bartimaeus, it says WE ARE EACH THE MAIN CHARACTER IN OUR STORY OF LIFE. **DON'T MISS** YOUR PLOT POINTS. **IDENTIFY THEM & USE THEM TO MOVE YOU** closer to Jesus.

that he immediately turned and followed Jesus. Can you imagine his testimony to others?

Jesus is eager to answer prayers that bring hope and encouragement to others ... that advance the kingdom of God in this lost world. Don't miss your next defining moment. He loves using average people to do amazing things because then all the glory goes to Him. Cry out for Jesus and get ready for amazing!

And Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" And the blind man said to him, "Rabbi, let me recover my sight." And Jesus said to him, "Go your way; your faith has made you well." And immediately he recovered his sight and followed him on the way. (Mark 10:51-52)

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
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remember as a young mom being so excited to start homeschooling! I envisioned a small row of desks in a meticulously organized and colorfully decorated school room in our basement, posters of presidents and the cursive alphabet on the wall, an **American flag and manual** pencil sharpener strategically placed next to the oversized chalkboard at the front of the room. I expected large uninterrupted time blocks of teaching my attentive and eager "students" and on my big desk up front, a detailed planner laying open next to my "World's Best Teacher" coffee mug!

Well, it didn't take long for me to realize that my little "school" wasn't going to be so neat and tidy! In fact, after a couple of years, we ditched the school room altogether because it was never used. The desks? We donated them to Goodwill. My favorite picture now is of my son hanging upside down off the couch reading his physics textbook. I can count on one hand the times he actually sat in a chair to do school work.

Over time, my idea of "school" was morphing and my view of true education expanding. The big "Aha moment" came during one particularly difficult season. I had four little ones under 8 and was eagerly anticipating my fifth when sadly, I miscarried. In the days and weeks after losing this little one I was so distraught I didn't think I could handle "doing school." And that's when my sister, a seasoned homeschool mom, reminded me that school is really just living life together with my children: talking with them, grieving





with them, going on walks, doing chores, cooking, cleaning, and reading together.

My sister suggested that I take this opportunity to read aloud for long stretches everyday to my children. And so that's what I did. In fact, I would read for hours and hours each day — up to 6 hours a day. We would snuggle together on the couch, some of my girls would color and my son would play quietly with his legos or K'nex while listening to the stories. We read biographies, missionary stories, and classics. The time reading together became a healing balm to my soul and a binding glue between my children and I. We laughed together and cried together. And every time I stopped reading, I heard a chorus of eager voices crying out, "read, Mommy, read!" I found that my children were learning. My youngest was 2 years old, but we read real books, good literature. My children, unbeknownst to them, were growing in their vocabulary and grammar. They were learning geography and history, about foreign lands and cultures, about God and His kingdom, about character and morality all through the books I was reading aloud to them. We would stop and discuss ideas or concepts they didn't understand as we were drawn closer by experiencing these wonderful stories together.

I wouldn't trade those days for anything! What a rich time it was! And when we did return to doing some more traditional math, English, and history, my view of education had been forever changed. My "school" would be forever different: more relationships, less rigid routine; more conversation, less teaching; more real life, less textbooks; more hands-on, less sitting still; more adventure, less boredom; more whole books, less workbooks; more laid back, less stress. And we kept reading aloud, at least one hour a day, which I continued to do until my children graduated from high school. My goals had changed as well. Instead of tests and grades, I wanted to see my children

love learning because I knew this would help them in whatever sphere God placed them.

Whether you're

experiencing a season of loss and grief, are in the throes of trying to homeschool with toddlers under foot, or are struggling to keep your children's attention for school, just remember that homeschooling is a lifestyle, not a classroom. As you pass on your own love of learning to your children and introduce them to great books through reading aloud, you are equipping them for life. So hop on the couch with a good book and give your desks to Goodwill!

t does not take a majority to prevail, but rather an irate, tireless minority keen to set brushfires of freedom in the minds of men."

—Samuel Adams

Early in our nation's history, brushfires of freedom sustained our independence from a tyrannical empire. Other brushfires throughout our history brought forward a civil war, women's suffrage, civil rights, abortion rights, marriage rights, and, more recently, gender rights. Not all these brushfires fulfilled the desired rallying cry of freedom because they were not grounded in God's righteousness.

Today, a brushfire is sweeping across the nation calling itself "school choice." A majority of state legislatures introduced bills this year to establish programs to fund private schools and home education.

Not a True Choice

In the early years of the homeschool movement, a spark grew into a brushfire of freedom in large part because families were willing to sacrifice for the cause. For the Christians in the movement, God's command to disciple their children was

the central driving force. They saw clearly the trajectory of the government schools and its goal of stealing the souls of their children. Despite the real threat of being imprisoned, following God was not an option; it was the only choice.

Purveyors of the school choice movement are trying to convince homeschoolers that government money provides a way for families to choose the best education for their children. But what they're selling is a false choice. All the choices they are presenting will be ruled by government bureaucrats. We all inherently know: what the government funds, the government runs.

Most of the "school choice" bills introduced this year include bigger government and increased regulations for private and home educators who choose to accept taxpayer funds. Big, new government bureaucracies in partnership with private entities are built to manage the oversight of the funding. Requirements for homeschoolers using the funding often include frequent meetings with certified teachers, usage of curriculum tied to state standards, and yearly testing. Basically, it's public school at home. A choice we've already rejected.

True Brushfires of Freedom

It is time to rekindle the sparks that began the homeschool movement some fifty years ago and

revive the brushfire of educational freedom. Government-funded programs will never bring God's truth to bear on the realities of this world.

Brushfires begin within each heart and mind that is set on the truth of God's Word. Jesus set us free and gave us liberty; it is this truth that God commands us to set ablaze in our children.

School choice advocates are relying on the greed of man to propel their cause. Politicians, nonprofits, and governments benefit from the enlargement of the government-funded and run education system and the number of people growing dependent on it. Yet, our cause rests in the humility of utter reliance on God for our very breath and a growing awe of who He is. The time has come to set afresh the brushfire that first brought us freedom and to lead others — especially our children — to the liberty found only in Jesus.

or as long as I can remember, the voices of the homeschool movement have not changed. Except for a few who have moved on for various reasons, we have generally been listening for years to the same people repeatedly affirming that homeschooling is worth it. A handful of homeschool graduates, such as Israel Wayne, Kevin Swanson, and Bradley Pierce tout the benefits of a discipleship-based homeschool education, but for the most part, homeschooling was illegal while they were being educated. I am a recent homeschool graduate, but I wonder, where are all the others like me?

My parents were not homeschooled, and initially not even interested in having a large family. God in time changed their hearts. such that I am the oldest of seven and was homeschooled all the way through high school graduation. My experience was not unlike that of most average homeschoolers in the 2010's. For me, it was a very positive experience overall, and I have every intention of being a homeschool parent (once I get married and become a parent, of course).

Through a providential set of circumstances, I am currently working for Heritage Defense, an organization that gives Christian homeschool families peace of mind by providing full legal representation against CPS. (Employee bias aside, I highly recommend Heritage Defense membership for any homeschool family in addition to becoming a member of HSLDA.) It is a tremendous blessing to work with other homeschool graduates to defend other homeschool families.

Of course, I have plenty of friends and acquaintances (not to mention siblings) who homeschool their children or are still being homeschooled by their parents. I know other homeschool graduates are out there, but why do we not hear from them? Even more troubling, why are the vocal homeschool graduates the ones who disown their upbringing with negativity?

I believe part of the problem is that homeschooling was hard and dangerous back in the 1980's — when parents not only sacrificed their time and energy, but also risked their liberty by homeschooling illegally. Now that homeschooling is legal in every state, it is growing in popularity across all demographics. Could it be that now home education is an easier and more popular education choice, homeschool graduates take their education for granted and do not feel like they need to speak up for it? Or do they only see it as an option among other options?



The issue is much more serious than that. Home discipleship is a biblical imperative. To those of us who were homeschooled, the necessity and expediency of homeschooling seems obvious. But to anyone looking from the outside, the contrast between the vocal apostates and the apparent lack of recent success stories is striking. The homeschool legends cannot be the only ones to propound the blessings of homeschooling. It is time for average homeschool graduates to stand up and say it with them. We do see homeschooling as the best option. We are profoundly grateful for our parents' sacrifice. And we have every intention of homeschooling our children.

We cannot lose the vision to disciple children through home education simply because our parents happened to homeschool us in the 2010's (or 2000's, or 90's, etc). Standing on the shoulders of giants, we must not only *recall the glorious deeds of*

the Lord, and His might, and the wonders that He has done, but tell them to the coming generation (Psalm 78:4 ESV).

If we do not tell of the Lord's glorious deeds in homeschooling, we risk falling into the same trap as ancient Israel by becoming another generation after them who did not know the Lord or the work that He had done for Israel (Judges 2:10 ESV). Galadriel's recounting that, "Much that once was is lost, for none now live who remember it," must not be true of Christian homeschoolers who seek to raise their children in the wisdom and instruction of the Lord.

The world is changing, and it needs to know that following God's instructions for educating children at home actually works. So, if you are a homeschool parent, thank you. If you are a prospective homeschooler, do it. And if you are a homeschool graduate, don't pretend you aren't. Carry on the heritage. Because you know better than anyone that homeschooling is worth it.

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f you spend a short time with even a few children, you will quickly realize that they exhibit a wide range of reading readiness and aptitude. While few of us are stressed by early readers, many become concerned when reading is delayed or difficult for a child. In great part this is amplified by our national obsession with academic performance and a belief that earlier reading is somehow an indicator of future success - which it is not.

And while there are certainly better and worse methods of teaching reading, even the best instruction can still fail to help a child to read before he or she is ready. If you have enough children,

you will likely have at least one who gains reading fluency at an older age than you might prefer.

In our case it was, thankfully, number six of our seven kids who had the hardest time. I say "thankfully" because if he had been the first of our children, we would have believed that we were the most incompetent homeschool parents in the world. He could not really decode even four-letter words at ten years of age. He did not read a book until he was twelve, and getting him to do it was a constant challenge until about age fourteen. However, we had enough parenting and teaching experience to understand that it was his neurology — not his intelligence — that made it difficult.

Various factors influence reading aptitude. Most commonly, we hear the term dyslexia in regard to a person who cannot learn to read as easily as others. But there are other possible causes as well. Sometimes the challenge is visual: a lack of acuity or a weakness in convergence of vision. These conditions can often be helped by behavioral or practical optometry, so it is advisable to have a child's eyes checked should vision be suspect. Another impediment to reading can be ADHD or even a form of auditory processing disorder, which can interfere with phonemic

awareness (attaching sounds to letters and letter combinations) or basic comprehension.

"True" dyslexics, like my son, will often find that two-dimensional figures such as numbers and letters will "flip" or "reverse" in their mind, thus creating inconsistencies in how they see text. To understand this better, I recommend Ron Davis' book, The Gift of Dyslexia, wherein he tells how, as an autistic, dyslexic adult, he taught himself to read when he figured out what his brain was doing, and shares many of his strategies with the reader. Some of his techniques do not make much sense to us who are not dyslexic. But one of the most important things we should keep in mind is that indeed there are certain advantages to having this unusual skill: dyslexics often become excellent inventors, engineers, designers, or entrepreneurs because they actually see the world differently from the rest of us. Another valuable resource in this vein is *The Dyslexic Advantage* by Brock and Fernette Eide, whom I have interviewed on my podcast. I also asked my son (as an adult) to come on our podcast and reflect on what it was like growing up dyslexic. Now I am not saying to give up on teaching dyslexic kids to read. They need the orthographic information and lots of practice, probably more than the average. What I do suggest is that you should not be stressed by the time it takes, and do not burden yourself with unnecessary worry by comparing your child's reading with other children's, based on their age. We generally don't worry about whether a child walks early or late — all children learn to walk (serious disability notwithstanding). If we begin something like music lessons, we do not compare children with each other based on age or number of years of practice. What's important is that they learn to play something and hopefully appreciate music more. Each child develops at his or her own rate, and as long as we continue to saturate their environment with letters and words. stories and literature, we can be confident that he or she will ultimately learn to read and probably enjoy it. It is extremely rare to meet a dyslexic home educated student who does not eventually come to read well; you just cannot cause that to happen by a certain age.

But what to do in the meantime? What if a child is nine — or twelve — and cannot read much? In

a typical school environment, this would be very handicapping because so much information has generally been acquired through reading. One way to think about it is to adjust your definition of reading. Commonly, reading is understood as "decoding with our eyes the symbols that make words, and visually taking in sequences of words which communicate ideas." However, not everyone reads with their eyes. Blind people, for example, often learn to read with their fingers. Dyslexics often benefit greatly from "reading with their ears." In fact, organizations such as the International Dyslexia Association and Learning Ally provide a multitude of resources including a huge collection of audiobooks that can be used by those who cannot read the text versions — even when at a college or university level.

This is what we (and many other parents) discovered. What did my son do for "homeschool" when he could not read or do math on paper? For seven or eight years!? Well, we not only read aloud to him as much as time would permit, we loaded him up with audiobooks, let him hang out with his older sisters and overhear what they were learning, and did spelling

and math verbally — no paper involved. One result of this was that he could "read" with his ears for many hours a day, sometimes five, six, eight, or more, while doing other things: building forts, playing with LEGOs, climbing trees, drawing pictures, pretending to do chores, etc. And during that time (approximately grades one through six or seven), he became the most literate of my children, having devoured so many books during the first half of his school years that he was like a walking encyclopedia of novels. When he did start writing fluently around the age of fourteen, his prose was in many ways more eloquent than any of his sisters' at that age. Why? He had the advantage of having heard more and better English literature than anyone else!

My most useful bit of advice is this: better late than too early. By stressing and trying to force a child to read before he or she is developmentally ready, we can exacerbate the problem. If a child can't read and is having a terrible time trying, our anxiety and insistence can cause the child to hate the very idea of reading and create more resistance, even after he or she is older and better able to wrestle control over eyes and brain. Try to stay relaxed, trust that it will all come out well in the end, and remain joyful. Many times I have said this prayer: "Okay, God, this is your child, so this is your problem. I can't fix it, but I know you have a perfect plan." Which may be the most important thing of all when raising a child for whom reading does not come easily. -
