END-OF-SESSION REPORT

About the Colorado Homeschool Freedom Team

The Colorado Homeschool Freedom Team is a ministry of CHEC, which envisions families honoring Jesus Christ by embracing home discipleship that is Christ centered, parent led, and free from government control. This year, three young women served as interns for the CHFT and assisted in research and advocacy at the Capitol. They also learned important aspects of applying a biblical worldview to policy making.

The march toward the total transformation of Colorado continues unabated. The 2023 legislative session was the worst since the complete takeover by the Democrats in 2019. This report only touches on the devastation brought about by policies grounded in atheism, environmentalism, socialism, and the normalization of depravity. During the recent three-year long pandemic, a magnifying glass was placed on the education system and parents began to see the truth of what their students were learning. Many bills were brought to address the poor academic and psychological outcomes in the government schools. One such bill, HB23-1003 *School Mental Health Screening*, was introduced early in the session. If passed in its original form, the bill would have violated parental rights by allowing a student to override a parent's decision and would neglect to notify parents about any mental health concerns. Because of the hard work of many and the unmerited favor of the Lord, the bill was amended to restore parental rights and keep homeschoolers from being drawn into the net of these mental health screenings. Praise God!

Just before the end of the session, a more insidious bill, SB23-296 *Prevent Harassment & Discrimination in Schools*, was introduced and pushed through the legislature. It not only keeps parents out of the process outlined in the bill, but it serves to eradicate the 1st Amendment in all public schools by forcing students to comply with state-compelled speech. What will happen to the right of conscience secured by the 1st Amendment when the generation taught to conform their beliefs to the state become our leaders? That is where you, brave parents, come in. *Teach your children well so that the liberty given to us by Christ will not die with us!*

HOMESCHOOL

According to HSLDA (hsllda.org), there were over forty school choice bills attempting to use government funding for private homeschools introduced across the nation this year. CHEC stands in opposition to any government funding for homeschoolers. *Government money always comes with some form of government control.*

HB23-1079 (DeGraaf) Income Tax Credits for Nonpublic Education

Parents would have been able to claim an income tax credit if they removed their child from the public school and, either sent them to a private school or homeschooled them. Although it was written to keep any accountability measures out of the bill, it may have been in violation of the law which now requires government oversight over all tax credits. **Failed in the House Education Committee.**

HB23-1188 (Soper, Rich) Individualized Learning Schools & Programs

The most concerning bill for private home educators of the session! In its original form, it read like a treatise of almost every accountability measure they would like to see for homeschooling families. For many reasons, including our opposition, the bill was gutted in committee. **Failed to make it to the House floor for a vote.**

ECONOMIC

Many bills impacting the economic stability of the family were passed in the name of climate change and the housing crisis. Check out coloradotaxpayer.org to investigate them.

TABOR, or the Taxpayer Bill of Rights, is the only thing keeping the growth of government in Colorado under control. Every year there are attempts to diminish the power of TABOR to satisfy the insatiable appetite for the unfettered growth of government. This year, through the two bills listed below, the voters are being asked to decide the future of TABOR.

HB23-1311 (DeGruy Kennedy, Weissman, Hansen, Hinrichsen) Identical Temporary TABOR Refund

The passage of this bill depends on the outcome of the ballot initiative created in SB23-303. It changes the formula by which TABOR refunds are distributed to taxpayers – essentially acting as a redistribution of wealth scheme. Instead of giving those who actually pay more taxes more of a refund, all monies returned are distributed “equitably” regardless of how much in taxes you paid.

SB23-303 (Fenberg, Hansen, DeGruy Kennedy, Weissman) Reduce Property Taxes & Voter-approved Revenue Change

This bill puts an initiative on the 2023 November ballot. It temporarily reduces property taxes while asking the people if they will allow the government to keep their TABOR refunds so the state can backfill the revenue lost by the counties and cities due to the decreased property taxes. Meaning, taxpayers are still paying for those property tax increases.

EDUCATION

HB23-1003 (Michaelson Jenet, Cutter) School Mental Health Screening

CHEC worked with Representative Evans to get homeschoolers who use part-time public school programs out of this bill. We also worked with Senator Smallwood to restore the rights of parents to direct the care of their own children. The Lord blessed our efforts! Yet, we remained opposed to the jurisdictional overreach of the government into the family outlined in this bill. (See front page for more information on this bill.)

HB23-1098 (Frizell, Bradley, Pelton B) Women's Rights in Athletics

This bill would have preserved the ability of women to compete in sports against only biological women. **Failed in the House State, Civic, Military, & Veterans Affairs Committee.**

HB23-1246 (McCluskie, Pugliese, Buckner, Will) Support In-demand Career Workforce

Sets aside \$43.6 million to provide funding for credentialing several identified in-demand careers including early childhood education, law enforcement, firefighting, forestry, construction, and nursing.

SB23-061 (Marchman, Kolker, Kipp, Lukens) Eliminate State Assessment in Social Studies

This bill would have eliminated the state test for social studies administered in the elementary and secondary public schools.

Failed to make it to the House floor for a vote.

SB23-296 (Winter, Marchman, Bacon, Herod) Prevent Harassment & Discrimination in Schools

This bill will make accommodations for students who experience “unwelcome” physical or verbal conduct, or any written communication directed toward the student’s perceived or actual protected class. Only certain students are protected. (See front page for more.)

GUN RIGHTS

The ability to possess a firearm matters because it is an unalienable, God-given right enshrined in the 2nd Amendment. Enabling the government to determine the validity of this right endangers all other God-given rights, including the pillars of home education — religious liberty and parental rights. The Office of Gun Violence Prevention was created in the Colorado Department of Public Health & Environment to curb gun violence in 2021 (HB21-1299). We will continue to see legislation restricting the Second Amendment as this office continues its work.

HB23-1219 (Froelich, Amabile, Hansen, Sullivan) Waiting Period to Deliver a Firearm

The time period for CBI to return the results of the required background when purchasing a firearm is extended to a minimum of three days without an outer limit.

SB23-168 (Jaquez Lewis, Kolker, Mabrey, Parenti) Gun Violence Victim’s Access to the Judicial System

Victims harmed by an individual using a firearm can now sue anyone selling, manufacturing, or distributing a firearm, ammunition, or various components of firearms.

SB23-169 (Mullica, Danielson, Duran, Hamrick) Increasing Minimum Age to Purchase Firearms

The minimum age to possess a firearm is raised to 21 years old with some exceptions.

SB23-170 (Sullivan, Fenberg, Bacon, Weissman) Extreme Risk Protection Order Petitions

The bill expands who can request the removal of a person’s guns without due process to include mental health professionals, educators, and district attorneys.

SB23-279 (Fields, Hansen, Boesenecker, Joseph) Unserialized Firearms & Firearm Components

Knowingly possessing or selling firearms without a serial number placed on specific parts of a firearm after January 2024 is unlawful. Will by necessity create a state registry.

LIFE

SB23-188 (Gonzales, Jaquez Lewis, Froelich, Titone) Protections for Accessing Reproductive Health Care

Colorado is now a sanctuary state for reproductive health care providers — meaning anyone providing services for abortion and gender-affirming care. Forces local entities to allow abortion centers in certain areas. Requires health insurance companies to cover these services and more.

SB23-189 (Moreno, Cutter, Michaelson Jenet, Garcia) Increasing Access to Reproductive Health Care

This bill will require certain insurance providers to cover, free of charge, care around HIV and STIs. Minors can now receive contraceptive procedures, supplies, or information without parental consent or notification.

SB23-190 (Winter, Marchman, McCormick, Epps) Deceptive Trade Practice Pregnancy-related Services

This bill attempts to silence pregnancy centers by classifying their advertising as “deceptive.” Makes the dispensing of the abortion reversal pill illegal. (Note: A lawsuit is in process by a Denver-area Health Center.)

PARENTAL RIGHTS

HB23-1029 (Bradley, Baisley) Prohibit COVID-19 Vaccine to Minor Without Consent

This bill would have required parental informed consent before a minor received a COVID-19 vaccine and made it a crime to discriminate against any minor not receiving the vaccine. **Failed in the House Health & Insurance Committee.**

HB23-1142 (Pugliese, Kirkmeyer) Information of Person Reporting Child Abuse

People reporting child abuse or neglect do not currently have to provide their information. This bill would have required they provide their name and contact information restoring the Constitutional right to face your accuser. **Failed to make it to the House floor for a vote.**

HB23-1160 (Evans) Colorado TRAILS System Requirements

Once an individual is accused of child abuse or neglect, they are placed into a database called TRAILS which shows up on a background check. This bill would have outlined a process for the individual to appeal the decision made by a county department and enable the removal of an innocent person's information from the database. **Failed to make it to the House floor for a vote.**

HB23-1191 (English, Fields) Prohibit Corporal Punishment

This bill prohibits the use of corporal punishment in the public school, child care centers, family child care homes, or specialized group facilities. Will this policy reach into private family homes in the future?

HCR23-1004 (Bradley) Fundamental Rights for Parents

This bill would have authorized a ballot initiative amending the Colorado Constitution to define parental rights as fundamental.

Failed in the House State, Civic, Military, & Veterans Affairs committee.

OTHER

HB23-1071 (Amabile, Bradfield, Simpson, Fenberg) Licensed Psychologist Prescriptive Authority

This bill expands who can prescribe psychotropic drugs to psychologists after fulfilling certain requirements.

HB23-1135 (Michaelson Jenet, Bird, Zenzinger, Smallwood) Penalty for Indecent Exposure in View of Minors

This bill makes it a felony to commit indecent exposure in view of a minor under 15 years of age if the offender is at least 18 years old and 4 years older than the child.

HB23-1224 (Brown, Jodeh, Roberts) Standardized Health Benefit Plans

Colorado is getting closer to getting universal health care for all. This bill makes changes to the health benefit exchange.

SB23-174 (Kolker, Gardner, Lukens, Winter T) Access to Certain Behavioral Health Services

Expands Medicaid mental health services to minors under 21 years old. Services available through school districts are included.
