DIRECTOR'S DESK

arents love their children and want what is best for them. It is something that is hard-wired into us by God and it is one of the reasons why homeschooling is so effective. Because we care so much for our children, we are willing to make the many sacrifices that homeschooling requires (I am sure you could help me count them). and we make them happily because we believe it is going to make a difference in our children's lives.

One of the big sacrifices that homeschooling parents make is giving up the safety net of relying on someone else for how our children "turn out" and assuming all of that "risk" ourselves. If our kids do not turn out or do not succeed, it is pretty hard to blame anyone else! This can be a scary thing for parents.

However, it is important to remember that God loves your children even more than you do. And, He has an even greater vested interest in their well being and future success. He has even put His own reputation on the line through the commands and promises that He gives to Christian parents. You do not control your children's destiny, God does. And that should be a big relief!

I have recently been memorizing Psalm 112 with my two oldest children, and I love the way this Psalm begins and the hope it gives me for my children's future. It says, *Praise the Lord! Blessed is the man who fears the Lord, who greatly delights in His commandments! His offspring will be mighty in the land; the generation of the upright will be blessed* (Psalm 112:1–2 ESV).

God has a vision for your children's future, and that vision is that they would be mighty and blessed. It is a vision of great influence and prosperity. It is not just a good vision. It is an AMAZING vision! It is so good in fact, that it makes me want to sit up and pay attention to what I can do to help secure it! As parents, we typically focus on the things that we give to our children as the primary drivers for their success. We focus on things like giving them good training, customized education, academic rigor, and curriculum with a biblical worldview, all of which are good and important things.

But Psalm 112:1–2 gives us a paradigm that runs counter to this natural tendency in our thinking. It teaches us that it is actually our own heart orientation toward the Lord as parents — specifically our fear of God and delight in His commandments — that is most important to our children's future success.

I do not know about you, but I find God's recipe for success to be refreshingly simple, straightforward ... and uncomfortably convicting. Because as parents, it is easy for us to spend lots of time analyzing our kids and not enough time analyzing our own hearts. What is more important to us, our children's academic achievement score or our personal fear of God and delight in His commandments?

Fear and delight is an unusual, powerful, and distinctly Christian combination of heart characteristics. A fear of God without delight in God and His commandments is what demons experience (James 2:19). But a delight in God without a proper fear of God and His commandments brings about the discipline and judgment of God. For example, in 1 Chronicles 13, we read that, *David and all Israel were celebrating before God with all their might*, as they transported the

Mighty in the LAND BY STEVE CRAIG ark to Jerusalem. But their delight was not properly accompanied with godly fear, which resulted in disobedience and the death of Uzzah.

Dads and moms, if we want our children to be mighty in the land and to be blessed, we need to be fearing God and delighting in His commandments ourselves. And it is not difficult to see how our own heart orientation and example will leak into our children's lives. After all, we all know that more is caught than taught.

Many children are raised in homes where there is fear without proper delight. This teaches children to doubt the goodness of God, which is at the heart of all sin. On the flip side, many children are raised in homes with emotion and experience driven Christianity, which leads to a delight that is not properly anchored in a godly fear and reverence for God. This teaches children to prioritize their feelings over obedience to God and His Word, which is equally deadly. GOD HAS A vision FOR YOUR CHILDREN'S FUTURE – A VISION OF GREAT INFLUENCE AND PROSPERITY. If is an amazing vision.

If you are like me, you probably feel like you need more of the fear of God *and* delight in God's commandments in your life. I encourage you to cry out to God for these things and to ask for the help of His Holy Spirit. I would also encourage you to spend time reading and meditating on passages like Psalm 112. And of course, make sure that you are part of a faithful church where the fear of God and delight in God is both taught and modeled.

Remember, God loves your children and wants what is best for them even more than you do. Follow His plan and trust His promises. You will not be disappointed!

re we teaching algebra or faith? Are we educating or disciple-ing our children? Are we stuffing facts into the brains of our children, or are we training the whole person of our child — emotions, mind, body, and soul — at the same time?

These are the essential questions that every parent in the world must answer before making decisions regarding their children's educational program. Haphazard handling of our child's education, or turning our children over to "experts" without first answering these questions, will be disastrous.

That is why Generations and CHEC encourage a full-orbed discipleship of the whole child when it comes to the education of children. Above all, the focal point for every parent — the highest concerns — should remain the character and faith of the child. This drives everything in the life of the child. What could be more important to the character of the child than to increasingly realize the awesomeness of God, the trustworthiness of God, and then to trust God? The believer lives by faith. She does algebra by faith. He grows in all areas of character by faith. Boiling all matters of character down to this, the child becomes more diligent, more honorable, more honest, and more conscientious — by faith.

When training the whole child, are we intending to teach algebra or faith? When "enforcing" the

study of math in homeschool, are we stuffing facts into the brains of children, or are we still training emotions, mind, body, and soul — at the same time?

But, here is the tough thing about this faith and character business. As mentors and teachers, we (the parents) will need to exemplify what we are attempting to teach. How easy is it to give way ourselves to fear, anxiety, faithlessness, or hopelessness?

Drawing from the story in the Gospels (Matthew 14), we find Jesus praying in the mountains while his disciples were rowing and rowing against winds and waves on the Sea of Galilee. Around 3:00 in the morning, He takes a saunter across the lake, sits down in the boat with the men and, we read, "immediately" they were on the other side. Such is the life of faith.

Now, what may be said about the "tiger mom" who is insisting upon excellence, but resorts to nervous admonitions? Any of us can slip into this at some point. She calls out to her child, "Why aren't you getting this math? You're going to be a failure in life! You'll never get into a good college! I will have failed! We will all turn out to be one big failure!" At the moment of failure and frustration, we still need to be asking the question, "What are we teaching our children? Are we teaching Algebra 101 or Anxiety 101? Or, shall we teach Faith 101 and Prayer 101?" Jesus was not teaching Rowing 101, as much as He was teaching Prayer 101 and Faith 101 on the Sea of Galilee. This should also be the focus of the godly homeschool.

Confidence is essential in math class and everywhere else in life. But, where is that confidence placed? At any point of personal struggle, two words are most valuable for every one of us: **"LOOK UP!" Do not look down. Do not look sideways to the winds and waves. Do not look at anybody else. Do not look inwards to oneself. LOOK TO GOD!** *For we walk by faith, not by sight* (2 Corinthians 5:7 ESV). We pray by faith. We move by faith. We live by faith. We teach by faith. We learn by faith. Faith is every day, all day!

This means that every teacher or exemplar will pay attention to their words in daily conversation and instruction. What characterizes our language dayto-day in home and school? Faith or fear? Hope or despair? Using the words "I can't," as the go-to

standard is a problem. Actually, there are two problems with "I can't." "I" and "can't." Scripture introduces a different language: *I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me* (Philippians 4:13 NKJV). Let us be overwhelmed not as much by the problems but by the absolute capability of God to handle the problems we face.

The tendency for all of us is to look for the sure deal, the easy solution, and the professional help for whatever our children need. We tend to want to walk by sight. But, Jesus tells us, "It's time to get out of the boat." Walking on water is tough. You are going to need to peel your fingers off the sides of the boat, look to Jesus, and start walking!

So the important question is this: Are we teaching our children faith? Or are we teaching them anxiety, self-reliance, pride, and fear of failure? While much of secular education today emphasizes the pride of man, self-sufficiency, and self-confidence, of course none of this is enough for walking on water and facing the greatest challenges of life and death (let alone algebra!). We must teach our children steadfast faith in God, the awesomeness of God, the trustworthiness of God, and prayer. Tell them stories of faith — Moses at the Red Sea (Exodus 14), facing the most impossible situation in the world, lifting the rod, and calling out, "Watch what God can do!"

Today, let us walk out the thrilling, daring, wonderfully exhilarating, tremendously rewarding, life of faith. God loves faith! He is looking for faith in us and in our children. There is nothing like stepping out in faith walking, waiting, and watching God work! JESUS WAS NOT TEACHING ROWING 101, AS MUCH AS HE WAS TEACHING **PRAYER 101** AND FAITH 101 ON THE SEA OF GALILEE. THIS SHOULD ALSO BE THE FOCUS OF THE **GODLY HOMESCHOOL.**

Rarely can our family be found without a great missionary book in hand. But it has not always been that way. When I was growing up, we gave money every year to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. I do not remember ever knowing what that meant or where the money was going, but I know we gave it proudly. I am sure there were missionaries our church gave to, but I just do not recall knowing about any until well into adulthood. Honestly, I was not too concerned about my lack of knowledge in this area. I did not know what I was missing!

One day we picked up the biography of Hudson Taylor. I will be honest and tell you that I did not know who he was. But the lines surrounding that booth at the homeschool convention were really long, so I figured reading missionary books was the right thing to do. (Go ahead and laugh!) It took many months for us to crack open the book, but one night we finally did. The kids huddled around me in silence as I read every word of the first chapter. And the second. And the third. After over an hour of reading, I had to put a stop to it, and the sighs in the room were heavy. This book may have been the most captivating one that we had ever read!


I was probably the most shocked of all. I had been putting off reading this because I had grossly misjudged the value of doing so. Um, and I kind of thought it would be boring. By the time we finished Hudson Taylor, I had ordered a dozen more missionary books, and we were changed forever.

There is just something so mundane about our little problems when you start looking at the problems that these amazing men and women faced. They risked their lives time and time again just to share the Gospel with the lost. Meanwhile, we are getting annoyed with the guy who pulled out in front of us or the lady who took up the whole aisle at Walmart. It really puts things into perspective, huh?

Studying the Lives of Missionaries Has Benefits

I do not ever want my kids to have idols, but they need good role models. Sure, parents can fill that role, but I am convinced kids need to see more than that. They need to see other Christians living out the faith both when times are good and when times are bad, truly trusting God. Missionary biographies provide this in a wonderful way, without making the child personally experience the same hardships.

Of course, missionary books reach further than faith, too. Kids become exposed to historical events, geography, world culture, church history, and more. There is nothing more fun than reading about an event in a textbook or resource and then having that same event show up later in a biography you are reading. This makes connections for kids and strengthens their knowledge.

The first series that we learned about was the "Christian Heroes: Then & Now" by YWAM Publishing. They have 42+ volumes of missionary biographies set in various time periods and countries. They do go in order by date, but you can read them in any order you prefer. The books are written for kids to understand easily, but young kids will need you to read them aloud as they are pretty meaty chapter books. (They now offer these books in e-book, Mp3, and CD format.)

YWAM Publishing also offers a "Christian Heroes for Young Readers Series" designed to introduce young children to the lives of Christian heroes. These are shorter and make it easier for elementary readers to read the books for themselves. These books are also great to read aloud if you want something shorter — especially for little ones who do not sit still long! They are written for ages 4-10, and kids just love the captivating rhyming text and unforgettable color illustrations. [YWAM Publishing will be selling these at their RMHC booth.]

Once I realized how important studying the lives of missionaries was in mine and my kids' lives, I knew we needed more. To meet that need, and after lots of research and study, I came up with a history curriculum that focuses on the biblical truths we can learn from Christian heroes of faith that use missionary books as its foundation.

Your family will see firsthand how to trust God even in the most difficult of circumstances as you journey with these missionaries around the world and learn history, language arts, geography, and more! From perseverance to compassion, *To Every Nation* is a 36-week study of real missionaries and their walk with God through the struggles of life. Through the biographies of these precious warriors, your family will grasp the depth of God's provision, deepen their faith, understand suffering, and become equipped to walk through life's trials.

More of Our Favorite Missionary Books

We make the study of missionaries an integral part of our homeschool history curriculum from the beginning by either using a curriculum focused there or adding in some of our favorite missionary books.

- Missionary Stories With the Millers These missionary stories are a great place to start, especially with little ones, because they are a little gentler. They are also shorter in length. But do not mistake that for weak. This book is packed full of adventure-filled stories that the whole family will love!
- Trailblazer Books We inherited a few of these missionary books two years ago in a bag of clothes that was given to us. What a gift they have been! The stories are much shorter than the two series above, making them a good fit for middle elementary age to read. My 3rd-grade son really enjoys them. [Christian Focus Publications will have some of these at their 2024 RMHC booth.]
- The Adventure Series This series is unique in the way it shares God's amazing creation through stories about missions. There are 15 books in the collection, and they promise a great geography lesson along with inspiration that will melt your heart toward missions.

 Hidden Heroes –

> A true series suitable for ages 9–12, Hidden Heroes promises all the adventure and history of a missionary biography. Enjoy both well-known stories as well as not as commonly known.

• The Brinkman Adventures — This series has provided countless hours of wholesome entertainment while we travel in the car. So far, there are two CD sets, both containing about five hours of audio drama based around real stories, but fictitious characters.

Life-Long Impact

I saw a marked difference in the way my kids viewed the world once we began studying missionaries. It is my hope that any of these suggestions do the same for you and your family. There are so many great resources out there; I encourage you to find and use them.

Parent-Led Daily BIBLE DEVOTIONS

can not possibly say how important it is for fathers to lead their families in daily family worship time. I know this is intimidating for many men because their fathers have not led them in teaching the Scriptures, so they have little to no example from which to draw. But we must start somewhere.

For single mothers, or wives who have unsaved husbands, or husbands who, for whatever reason, are unable or unwilling to lead family devotions, you need to serve as the sanctifying spouse in that situation and lead the children in family worship time yourself.

It is not the job of the church to teach your children in the Scripture (although they certainly can assist and supplement!). It is the responsibility of the parents. Please take your calling seriously. Family devotions are very important to our family. We finished reading Revelation 22 this morning, which means we have read, studied, and discussed every verse in the entire Bible as a family. This whole project has taken us something like five—six years to complete. We often include Bible maps, commentaries, supplementary videos, church history, word studies, and even music (playing Handel's Messiah for example, when we read passages that are set to music) into our family worship time. Our ideal is to get through an entire chapter per day, but this rarely happens because I encourage my children to ask questions as we go. It is not uncommon for us to spend the entire 30–45 minutes on only a half dozen verses.

I discuss our approach to "Bible Time" in my book, *Raising Them Up — Parenting for Christians*, in a chapter entitled, "How I Taught My Children to Sit Still and Be Quiet." I also discuss the importance of teaching through the entire Bible on a cycle of at least every seven years (three times before your children leave home) — as outlined in Deuteronomy 31, in my chapter, "The Seven-Year Teaching Method."

There really is not a "right" or "wrong" way to lead Bible devotion time with your children. Just do what works best for your family. I met one father who was so intimidated to lead family devotions he would not even open the Bible to read it aloud to them. He told me the only thing he knew how to do was operate a remote control to the TV. But he felt convicted to do something, so he ordered a bunch of Bible teaching videos from major Christian ministries he trusted. Each morning his family would watch 30 minutes of a sermon from a leading Bible teacher. They did this for several years before he felt confident in his knowledge and skill to start teaching his own children. But during that time, his family heard hundreds of hours of solid teaching and grew immensely in their spiritual lives as a family.

The main thing is to do something. Even if it is fiveten minutes a day. Just reading a few verses together, singing a worship chorus, and closing in prayer, if done consistently, will bear much fruit in your family's life over time.

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Standing Together **FOR FREEDOM**

A tsunami of legislation across the nation has hit the shores of homeschool freedom over the past several years in the name of either providing choice or keeping children safe.

States where government-funding mechanisms exist have seen efforts to bring independent homeschoolers under the same regulations as those receiving government money. Rules governing some existing programs have been tightened to constrain the definition of eligible expenses due to abuses and, in addition, causing the restriction of approved curriculum.

Impacts of government funding on independent homeschoolers:

- Conflation of all homeschoolers
- Dependence on governemnt
- Market contraints
- Increased regulations
 - ► Centralized database & data tracking
 - Required teacher licensing
 - ► Home visits
 - Curriculum & state standards
 - State testing
 - Background checks

Several states, in response to alleged child abuse, have attempted to further regulate homeschoolers by creating a centralized tracking registry for homeschooled students or requiring background checks for every adult in the home.

Colorado was in the top ten worst states in which to homeschool before our current homeschool statutes regulating home-based education were enacted. Despite being a moderately regulated state, we have enjoyed a long period of relative freedom in peace. But in the last few years, the school choice wave to use government funds for homeschoolers has placed pressure on our freedom and the cohesiveness of our community. The eyes of legislators and bureaucrats are now focused on our community - asking questions that have never been on their minds before. Imperative to the survival of our freedom is our ability to understand the bondage we left behind, the current trajectory of our education system, the nature of government, and the price of freedom.

The public education system from its inception was designed to produce a socialistic society, not an educated people capable of living in a free country. Recent trends of guiding emotions instead of training the mind have produced students to are failing academically and are saddled with mental health issues. (Check out The Art Club documentary at ArtClubMovie.com for a recent example of what's happening in Colorado schools.) School districts continually override parental authority and undermine

the family. Homeschooling, at its core, is a movement to preserve the foundations of the family as orchestrated by God.

Government by its very nature is force. As it grows, instead of securing our rights and protecting our freedoms, it gains more power to control those being governed. Home education is the only form of education in the state where the government has no control — allowing us to exercise our freedom of conscience and to establish a family life — directed by we, the parents — where our children can thrive and become who God made them to be.

Edmond Burke once stated, "The people never give up their liberties but under some delusion." It is essential that we wake up to the dangers that lay before us. It is for the freedom of our posterity that we must stand united against the encroachment of the state apparatus into our homes and our children's hearts and minds. Freedom requires sacrifice in the temporal, but God will reward us in eternity.

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Releasing Our ARROWS Into the World

The shaft must be straight and the proper weight for the game he is hunting.

Spring is a time of new beginnings. New beginnings imply changes — some welcome and some not so welcome. Our focus this time is on the many times of letting go that will occur in our lives as parents — releasing our little and not-so-little children into the world.

Psalm 127 tells us that our children are like arrows in the hands of a warrior and that the man who has a quiver full of children is blessed. My husband is a bowhunter. Through the years, our family has enjoyed the venison, elk, moose, and wild turkey that his skills have brought to our table. I have never seen him go out hunting with less than five arrows in his quiver, although he seldom needs to use more than one. He makes and examines his arrows carefully before leaving for a hunt. The fletching — the synthetic feathers that make the arrow fly straight — must be well-designed and carefully glued into place. As we raise our little ones unto the Lord, we must use exquisite care to help them to develop into godly men and women. When we are ready to release them into the world, they must fly straight and true. Initially, we send them out on little practice flights, always with a string attached to pull them back to the nest for more teaching and coaching. As they grow older, we can trust them with longer and more difficult flights until, finally, they are shot without strings into the world to serve the kingdom as mighty warriors for the Lord.

Parents are commissioned to watch over their little flock. But how easy it is to act as if our children are safe only with us. We need a balance between sheltering and trusting. How easy it is to forget that children all over the world manage to grow up without antibacterial soap, patented vitamins, and personal bodyguards (aka "mothers!") hovering over their every move. I found it helpful to picture my child sitting on my hand, outstretched to the Lord, knowing that even if I closed my fist to hold him tight, I could not totally protect him from all the world's dangers only His loving heavenly Father could do that.

Sometimes, we are called to release our children much earlier than we would have wished. In the Old Testament record of 1 Samuel, chapter 1, Hannah was called to give up Samuel to the Lord's service when he was only about five years old, the typical age of weaning among Hebrew mothers. In my own life, we were called to release a preborn son who died at eighteen weeks gestation — heart-wrenching, to be sure — but heart-warming to know that our little arrow had flown straight into the arms of Jesus.

In order to be sure our "arrows" will fly straight, we must set boundaries that limit what they are allowed to do. Toddlers may be briefly placed in a playpen during times when no one can actively supervise them. Soon they graduate to a baby-proofed room with a security gate. Before we know it, they have the run of the house, then the yard, and even the neighborhood, with parents needing to still monitor friendships, activities, and curfews.

These early limits not only protect the child from physical harm, but train him to obedience. God tells us in His Word, the Holy Bible, that we are to, *Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it* (Proverbs 22:6 ESV). The picture here is one of staking up a tomato plant. If the plant is not tied to the stake, the tomatoes do not develop properly. The very thing that restricts the young plant is what allows it to mature into all it was created to be.

The principle of balancing additional freedoms and privileges with additional responsibilities is an important one, particularly in a large family. Our five sons span almost ten years in age. The youngest obviously could not be allowed the same privileges as the oldest. On each birthday, they were granted new responsibilities, as well as new privileges.

We were pleased to discover the unexpected benefits of training our oldest child to obedience. As the younger ones came along, we as parents were already trained in the self-control necessary to be consistent in following through with discipline. We strove to create a culture of righteousness in our home — younger siblings noted how the older one acted and tended to follow in his path. This is not to say that they never challenged us. Each child had his own temperament and needed correction from time to time, but the expectations had been set. They learned that this is how people in our family act — a positive peer pressure that has been a powerful motivator in their lives. They do not want to disappoint God or their family members. This has been especially helpful during the teen years when increasing privileges permit additional temptations.

Several resources were especially helpful as we have learned when and how to give our sons additional freedom. The authors of each of the following books are Christians, although not all homeschoolers:

And Suddenly They're Thirteen by David and Claudia Arp was a real help as we came into the teen years. I recommend it for parents whose children are about eleven years old, so they can begin planning some of the rite-of-passage celebrations the authors recommend.

- In Spiritual Milestones, by Weidmann and Ledbetter, the authors offer detailed suggestions for celebrating these and other events. They also have large sections about "Crossing Into Adulthood" for young teens and "Committing to Purity" ceremonies.
- 3 A great resource to begin reading when your oldest is about fourteen is Give Them Wings, by Carol Kuykendall. The author discusses driving, curfews, career choices, graduation, etc., with special emphasis on helping parents through the emotions of letting go as their child becomes an adult member of the family. She also deals with self-care, laundry, budgeting, cleaning their rooms, and other responsibility issues. This tender book really helped me as our first-born left for college.

As parents, we will release our children many times throughout their lives, whether for an overnight at Grandma's or a field trip with other homeschoolers. When they leave home for college, career, or marriage, there will be another release. You may even face releasing your child to the foreign mission field or military service, realizing that they are safer there in God's will than at home but outside His will.

Eventually, the circle of authority between parents and child becomes a circle of counsel — you are no longer in charge. As our children establish their own homes, they will make their own decisions. Some choices will be wise, some not so wise. In other words, they will be much like us!

What a blessing it is to have an adult child — when he is considering marriage — come and say to you, "I want what you and Dad have." And what a privilege it is then to see them raising their own children (your grandchildren!) to be arrows properly prepared to shoot God's blessings out into the world.

Complicated after all

hen God was first calling me to homeschool, I questioned my abilities.

"Where am I going to set up a learning space?" "When am I going to find the time to teach?" "How are my kids going to respond to me as their teacher?" "Where do I even start?"

These were the thoughts that ran through my head. Solidifying our decision to homeschool was a challenge. But the truth is, we were over complicating it, which is easy to do when you are comparing it to the traditional education system.

I had an idea of how I wanted our learning space to be. There was a part of me that felt like I needed to have an aesthetically pleasing space. A space that met every need, with all the best supplies and all the best books about all the subjects that I felt obligated to teach. I was prepared to spend hours a day teaching my 4-year-old. I was stressing myself out trying to create an ideal learning space for her, so that I felt worthy of educating her.

One of our first homeschool lessons was a family outing to Garden of the Gods. My husband took the lead on this day. We would stop and read the information boards while we walked through the park. We kept track of how many types of birds we saw and picked wild flowers. After our stroll, we drove down the road to some picnic tables next to a creek. We prayed over our lunch and then the kids played in the creek with my husband. I could see the light in my daughter's eyes as we learned about nature together and embraced God's creation. It was at the end of that day that I realized the perfect learning space included all of us being together, experiencing the world.

I started following homeschooling pages on social media and researched accurate requirements for homeschooling a preschooler. I soon realized that having a perfect classroom set-up and hours of tightly, structured curriculum are not part of those requirements. The point of homeschooling is not to mimic the education system. It is to show kids and parents that there is a way to gain knowledge outside of classroom walls. This allows kids and parents to connect and learn alongside one another through immersion and interaction. I now know that the most impactful tools I have while educating my children are intention and connection.

There are learning spaces all around us that have more to offer than books and paper. Since our children are young, we utilize nature as a primary learning space and when that is not accessible, we turn to play-based [also called "hands-on"] learning and skill building! There is a Scripture I often refer to when I am feeling ill-equipped and unqualified. It is such a beautiful reminder that when we invite Jesus into everything we do — no matter how scary or unprepared we may feel — He will equip us with everything we need to succeed within His will.

Now may the God of peace who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great shepherd of the sheep, by the blood of the eternal covenant, equip you with everything good that you may do his will, working in us that which is pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen. (Hebrews 13:20, 21 ESV)

If you are feeling a call to homeschool or are feeling discouraged on your journey, I encourage you to reevaluate your expectations. Relinquish your need for perfection and do not over-complicate it. Invite God in. He will guide your steps and help you create the learning space that best suits you and your children. Embrace the differences that homeschooling brings, where monotony and pressure to perform do not need to exist. It is not so complicated after all.

GOT Community?

ave you ever seen the Sesame Street clips, "One of these things is not like the others?" I can not tell you how many times I walked into a group and that song played in my head. There were times in my life as a "military brat" that I was convinced it was my personal theme song.

We moved from Hawaii to upstate New York in the middle of winter. I went from shorts, tank tops, and Muumuu dresses to winter coats, boots, and turtlenecks. I was an 8-year-old not willing to give up her lovely Muumuu dresses either. To this day, I crack up at the picture of me wearing a turtleneck under my long tropical dress. I was certainly not like the others.

I think it is human nature to be insecure about our differences. The truth is, we are fearfully and wonderfully made, and the beauty of diversity is intentional. We have an enemy that wants us to divide, but the Lord delights in the unity of the Body!

Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity! (Psalm 133:1 ESV)

One of the ways we support homeschoolers in our state is directing them to find groups

that meet their needs. We have a growing directory of Christian faith-based groups all over the state. I hope you find community through one or more of those groups. It was crucial for me to attend the Mom's Night Out support group meetings as a homeschooler. I needed to know I was not alone. Even in that group, I had to take my thoughts captive and not allow the enemy to cause division. I would hear the testimony of one family and think to myself, *she is certainly not like me*. A dear friend of mine would usually interject with "or not" after someone shared the specifics of how she did something. It served as a reminder to not be burdened by things that make us different. We are not meant to be all the same. Our differences make "the Body" of believers complete.

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body — Jews or Greeks, slaves or free — and all were made to drink of one Spirit. For the body does not consist of one member but of many. (1 Corinthians 12:12–14 ESV)

Still, sometimes, we just need to find our people. You know, we need to find someone who can relate to the things we are going through. As a white mother, my black husband suggested that there were times when we needed a specific community for our diverse family. One time we went to a group open house and a woman spotted us from across the room. I could see eagerness in her eyes as she made a beeline to our family that looked like hers! Indeed, we found warm community with a variety of groups, but sometimes a specific niche was beneficial.

With this in mind, CHEC has four specific meet-up and resource workshops scheduled at the RMHC this June. We are all united in the call to homeschool and, I pray, in the Body of Christ. But, like my friend desperate to connect with someone traveling her road, maybe you need specific connections. Would you help us share these meet-up groups? Fearfully and **Wonderfully** MADE

Having a child who struggles to learn is one of the greatest challenges a homeschool parent can face. In working with homeschool families for over 20 years, I have seen first-hand the pain that this can cause a mama's heart and the worry on a father's mind.

I have heard the many questions that keep these parents up at night: *Are we doing the right thing? Should we put them in a different school setting? Did we choose the best curriculum for how they learn? How do we balance the attention they need with what our other children need? Am I teaching them correctly for their needs? Is there any way that we can help them overcome these challenges?* The best part of my job is providing reassurance to parents experiencing these worries by giving hope and a path forward through effective holistic treatment for their child! **BY ANDREA PITMAN**

You see, the child with learning struggles was created by an infallible God! He has provided an answer to ease the burden of learning difficulties through neuroplasticity. This is the God-given characteristic that allows the brain to be moldable, malleable, and changeable. In other words, our brains are "plastic" that can be transformed with the right help. This means that we can treat the root causes of learning disorders and difficulties, so that the limitations slowing the learning process can truly be overcome.

As Psalm 139:13–14 says, "For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well" (NIV). I love thinking about God knitting into the very fabric of our brains this innate ability to change and grow. I believe He gives us all the provisions we need to tackle the challenges that have been laid before us, including learning challenges. God did not create your child to struggle indefinitely. He gave the tools necessary, that when utilized, allow your child to move through and beyond their current limitations to achieve his or her full potential. His plan is good and full of hope. Our favorite Scripture at The Nectar Group is Jeremiah 29:11, "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to

prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future" (NIV).

Most parents at this point want to know how they can utilize neuroplasticity to help their child. The answer lies in the child's cognitive skills. We all have seven core cognitive skills (short term memory, long term memory, processing speed, visual processing, auditory processing, logic and reasoning, and attention). These are our thinking skills, and they allow us to problem solve, process and remember information, and pay attention. Most learning difficulties are caused by deficits in one or more of these cognitive skills. In the brain there are neural pathways for each of these seven cognitive skills.

If a skill is strong, that pathway will be wide and smooth, like a big, wide, multi-lane, paved highway. This is due to many neurons firing and wiring together to make a strong neural pathway. If a skill is weak, the pathway will be small and narrow, like a dirt road. This is caused by a lack of neurons firing and wiring together. This lack of neural circuitry is what causes learning problems. For example, if your child has a dirt road where they need a paved highway for processing speed, you will likely see this show up as being slow to complete tasks. (You might think an assignment should take 20 minutes but it turns into 2 hours or does not even get done at all!) Another way this shows up is that the child will zone out or be easily distracted.

If your child has a reading difficulty, such as dyslexia, this is caused by a weak pathway for auditory processing. This makes manipulation of phonemes (sounds) difficult, causes weak phonological memory, and simply makes fluent reading and spelling extremely challenging. We could name many examples, but the bottom line is to understand that if your child is struggling with learning, they likely have weaknesses in their cognitive skills.

So, how can this be treated? This is where neuroplasticity comes into play. The way these deficits are treated is by stimulating the weak areas of the brain through mental exercises that target specific pathways. During these exercises, the brain begins to fire neurons together in the targeted region. There is a law in neuroscience called Hebb's Law, which says, "neurons that fire together, wire together." When the child engages in the exercises frequently enough, for long enough, the neurons fire and wire together and pave that dirt road! This type of intervention, known as cognitive training, is a corrective measure that treats the root causes of learning disorders by using neuroplasticity! Pretty amazing, right? God did not create your child to **struggle** indefinitely. **He gave the tools necessary,** that when utilized, allow your child to **move beyond their current limitations** to achieve his or her **full potential**.

Cognitive Training is done through professionals at The Nectar Group, but you can also enhance the neural circuitry of your child's brain through nutrition, physical exercise, restorative sleep, and mental exercise. I recommend including brain boosting activities in your schooling! You can play card and board games that target specific cognitive skills (see <u>TheNectarGroup</u>. <u>com/Resources</u> for a list) or utilize brain teasers at transition times during the day. For example, have your kids count backwards by 4 from 100 or practice quickly retrieving information from their long-term memory by having them name as many ____ (dog breeds, stores, cities that start with the letter M, etc.) as possible in one minute. You can play word association games or even have them say the alphabet backwards as quickly as possible. Look for ways to incorporate this type of fun, brain-boosting activity when everyone needs a 'pick me up' during the day.

Most importantly, if your child is struggling to learn, have their cognitive skills assessed to unearth the root causes and enable a targeted treatment plan to be created. God has a plan for your child and their education. Overcoming learning challenges is possible! Even when learning is difficult, remember that your child is fearfully and wonderfully made, and God has a plan with a future full of hope! ■

always consider my time invested at the Rocky Mountain **Homeschool Conference** as my "professional development" as a home educator. I take my job educating my children seriously, and I devour the content of the workshops and special events at the conference each year.

One of the greatest opportunities at this annual June event is the Exhibit Hall. There I can research the latest curriculum, literature, learning games, and supplies. Talking to these exhibitors - many of whom are the authors of the curriculum — allows me to get hands-on instruction and in-person experiences with their products. This enables me to easily and quickly decide if they are a good fit for my family.

The vendors at the conference are very diverse. Some sell curriculum in full grade level sets or in individual subjects like Bob Jones University Press or Generations. Others specialize in a few subjects like Teaching Textbooks and Institute for Excellence in Writing (IEW). Along with the curriculum displays, there are service provider vendors representing extracurricular opportunities like American Heritage Girls and Civil

Air Patrol. Others are selling quality toys, games, and educational resources such as Discovery Toys and School Crossing. Being able to look through the curriculum and speak directly to the vendors saves me a lot of time and money that I could have wasted researching and ordering books and curriculum online that might or might not work with my teaching style or with my children's learning styles. Visiting the booths also gives me the opportunity to get on the vendors mailing lists, so I can receive their catalogs and emails and continue researching curriculum choices from home.

The Exhibit Hall can feel daunting, so here is some advice for navigating it ahead of time. Start by going to the RockyMountainHomeschoolConference.com/ Resource-Shopping web page.

First, do some research into the vendors who will be present. Each is listed lower down on that web page. Click on an exhibitor's logo for a hot link that takes you directly to their website.

Second, make a list of the vendors you would like to visit. There is a map of the Exhibit Hall you can access by clicking on the first blue drop-down bar, which will allow you to plot your course through the three different sections of the overall Exhibit Hall, which at the Marriott Denver Tech Center includes the Atrium, Central, and Pavilion areas.

Third, set aside the time to thoroughly tour, shop, and purchase in the multi-space

Exhibit Hall. It tends to be busiest on Saturday, so if you would really like to speak with the vendors about their products, I suggest setting aside several hours on Friday, with final purchases made Saturday. If you prefer a less crowded hall, visit while there are General Sessions and workshops going on during Friday and Saturday. A number of exhibitors will be offering "Grand Opening Party Only" (Thursday 4:45-8pm) and/or "RMHC specials." You can investigate these ahead of time when the second blue drop-down bar is ready in late May on that same web page. The overall schedule, including Exhibit Hall shopping hours, is found at RockyMountainHomeschoolConference.com/Schedule.

As a final reminder, exhibitors travel from all over the country to attend the RMHC and renting space for a booth and travel for a host team is costly. Please support these businesses by purchasing from them, as many are "mom and pop" entrepreneurial endeavors. They believe in homeschooling and are seeking to serve our unique community. If you see something in the Exhibit Hall that will enrich your homeschool, please purchase it there directly from the vendor.

I hope you have a wonderful time at the Rocky Mountain Homeschool Conference getting equipped for your next year of homeschooling.



It has been an outstanding time, that is for sure! In 2023, I handed out the audio tour devices in front of the Semisaurous tour activity.
